

All of the penalties contained in the SAPO and SASO Petitions are built into the Ordinance, as Sections 5 and 6. The title "penalty" was deleted from Section 4 because that word does not accurately describe the contents of that Section, but the substance of the two initiatives is intact. In addition, the allegation that County's intent is to "frustrate the intent and undermine the actions of the voters" that the County deleted the severability clause. However, the severability clause is clearly set out in Section 5 of the Ordinance. another allegation that the County seeks to invalidate the Ordinance. This is untrue. The County seeks review of the validity of the Ordinance due to legal issues it has identified as arising from it.

Dan, I'm sorry I could not get back to you yesterday. In response to your questions:

No, that is not why the County is submitting the Ordinance to Court.

The County submitted its Ordinance to the Court under a special statutory proceeding under Oregon Law, for "Judicial Examination and Judgment of the Court as to the Regularity, Legality, Validity and Effect" of the Ordinance. The County Board has been clear that its desire is to uphold the will of the voters. That said, there are several legal questions that arise from the Ordinance. As an example, Oregon law generally does not permit the County to regulate within the City limits without consent. We have asked the Court to inform us whether the cities have consented. This and many other issues arising from the two voter passed initiatives and the Ordinance implementing them put the County and its residents in legal "limbo". The statutory process allows the county to get binding decisions from the Court which will allow us to move forward with the Ordinance in a form that is legal. This will give the Sheriff and DA certainty as to what can and cannot be prosecuted and what the County can budget. As an example of the budget issue, the initiatives and Ordinance provide that the County cannot budget funds in any way related to the enforcement of most criminal firearms laws. However, the County is required by law to provide court space for the Circuit Court and pay for it. We've asked the Court how we should handle that inconsistency. This proceeding will also inform residents of the County what firearms laws do apply to them so that no one is unwittingly found to violate a federal or state firearm law believing that they don't apply. We don't think anyone would want that result. So, to be clear, the County is not seeking to invalidate the Ordinance, only to get answers to the many legal questions raised by it. I'm attaching the Petition and Ordinance so that you can have a better idea of all the legal questions for which we are seeking clarity.

Related to your other questions, the Ordinance has no criminal penalties and we have no schedule from the Court at this point. I hope to have some direction about a briefing schedule soon.

It will provide the Sheriff and District Attorney with certainty as to what can and cannot be prosecuted. It will also safeguard the County in the event other legal matters, like lawsuits, are raised against the Ordinance in the future.

"This proceeding will also inform residents of the County what firearm laws do apply to them so that no one is unwittingly found to violate a federal or state firearm law that they believe doesn't apply because of the initiative measures," Hanson said. "We don't think anyone would want that result."

The County expects a briefing schedule to be approved by the Court soon and hopes to have a hearing before the end of June, 2021.

Fulton judge to hear lawsuit over Augusta-area court split AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) - A lawsuit challenging a plan to create a new judicial circuit covering **COLUMBIA COUNTY** will be heard by a retired Fulton County judge. The Augusta Chronicle reports Senior Judge Gail S. Tusan was appointed to preside over the case on Wednesday after all the judges in the current Augusta Judicial Circuit recused themselves. Tusan became a senior judge in 2019 after 35 years on the bench in Fulton County. The lawsuit seeks to invalidate a law passed by the General Assembly this year that would split COLUMBIA COUNTY from the three-county circuit that also includes Richmond and Burke counties. Those two would remain as the Augusta Circuit. The suit contends the law, which takes effect July 1, violates the separation of powers between the three branches of government. The suit says Republican state Sen. Lee Anderson of Grovetown overrode the authority of the judiciary to decide whether new circuits or judges are needed when he introduced the bill. A workload analysis, based on year-old data because of the pandemic, showed COLUMBIA COUNTY has an adequate workload to justify three judges. A circuit of Richmond and Burke counties, however, would have a workload qualifying it for six judgeships. The new law provides for only five superior court judgeships for Richmond and Burke counties. The suit also alleges the law violates the Voting Rights Act by creating a separate, white-majority circuit, diluting the votes of Black COLUMBIA COUNTY residents, and voiding the votes of residents in the three counties who elected the first Black district attorney of the

After President Joe Biden took office, conservative lawmakers in several states proposed banning police from enforcing federal gun measures, and at least one proposal in Arizona has been signed into law. The movement hasn't yet faced a major legal challenge. The Oregon case was filed by COLUMBIA COUNTY under an unusual provision in state law that allows a judge to examine a measure before it goes into effect. No timeline has been set for a court hearing. "This will allow the court to tell us whether the county can actually decline to enforce certain state laws, and it will tell us how to abide by the will of the voters to the extent that we can," said Sarah Hanson, who serves as counsel in the conservative-leaning county in.

Let it be known that I am very unhappy with the recent tampering with the SAPO/SASO laws. I am also understandably irritated that I was not included in discussions about this since I was the Chief Petitioner for both ballot measures, spent five years of my life getting them passed, and even collected signatures in the rain with my leg broken in 3 places. If for no other reason, I should have been notified as a matter of common courtesy.

I am not happy with the two laws being blended, as there was no need, as they were totally different laws with the exception of the penalties.

A recent email from my Attorney confirmed some of my suspicions when he had this to say: "Should not be able to validate a ballot measure. They are pulling some monkey business."

I hope I am wrong about this scenario, but I get the feeling that this is a set up to get the SASO in front of a judge, so that he can throw it out. I know that there are people at the county level that did not like these laws, but the people have spoken, not once, but twice, and we do not elect kings. Meanwhile, I hope the county will defend this law to the utmost of its ability as it is required to do whether the person defending it likes the law or not.

I have already noticed that when coming to the penalties portion of this new SASO 2021-1, the penalties have all but been removed by using the word MAY...that is not what we wanted.

Please be advised that if this new law does not pass muster, and is kicked to the curb, there will be accountability in one form or another. Could be a lawsuit, could be recall/s, do not know until the final result, but "We the People" will not take this lying down, so I hope this is all on the up and up. I do not trust it.

Remember that a lot of time, effort, and money have been spent to get these laws on the books, and that we have already gone to court once.

If anyone can let me know how this originally came about and why, I would love to talk to them. Have a great day, and now we're on the record.

Let it be known that I am very unhappy with the recent tampering with the SAPO/SASO laws. I am also understandably irritated that I was not included in discussions about this since I was the Chief Petitioner for both ballot measures, spent five years of my life getting them passed, and even collected signatures in the rain with my leg broken in 3 places. If for no other reason, I should have been notified as a matter of common courtesy.

I am not happy with the two laws being blended, as there was no need, as they were totally different laws with the exception of the penalties.

A recent email from my Attorney confirmed some of my suspicions when he had this to say: "Should not be able to validate a ballot measure. They are pulling some monkey business."

I hope I am wrong about this scenario, but I get the feeling that this is a set up to get the SASO in front of a judge, so that he can throw it out. I know that there are people at the county level that did not like these laws, but the people have spoken, not once, but twice, and we do not elect kings. Meanwhile, I hope the county will defend this law to the utmost of its ability as it is required to do whether the person defending it likes the law or not.

I have already noticed that when coming to the penalties portion of this new SASO 2021-1, the penalties have all but been removed by using the word MAY...that is not what we wanted.

Please be advised that if this new law does not pass muster, and is kicked to the curb, there will be accountability in one form or another. Could be a lawsuit, could be recall/s, do not know until the final result, but "We the People" will not take this lying down, so I hope this is all on the up and up. I do not trust it. Remember that a lot of time, effort, and money have been spent to get these laws on the books, and that we have already gone to court once.

If anyone can let me know how this originally came about and why, I would love to talk to them. Have a great day, and now we're on the record.

Columbia County Second Amendment Sanctuary Ordinance moves to Validation

(Columbia County, Oregon) – The Columbia County Second Amendment Sanctuary Ordinance, recently adopted by the Columbia County Board of Commissioners to implement the intent of the voters as demonstrated by the passage of the "Second Amendment Preservation Ordinance" in 2018 and the "Second Amendment Sanctuary Ordinance" in 2020, will now move on to Validation proceedings in Columbia County Circuit Court.

In passing the Ordinance, many provisions of both Measures 5-270 and 5-278 remain the same. The Ordinance amended the Second Amendment Sanctuary Ordinance to incorporate provisions of the Second Amendment Preservation Ordinance where it differed from the Second Amendment Sanctuary Ordinance. The new Ordinance's adoption kept it consistent with County practice and corrected scrivener errors in the Acts while preserving the intent of the voters. The Second Amendment Preservation Ordinance was then repealed.

The passage of the two initiatives and subsequent adopted Ordinance raises several important legal questions about what firearm regulations can be enforced in Columbia County, according to County Counsel Sarah Hanson. To gain clarity from the Court about the matter, the County filed a "Petition for Validation of Local Government Action," which authorizes the circuit court to conduct a judicial examination of the Ordinance and provide a judgment of the court as to its regularity and legality.

"This will allow the Court to tell us whether the County can actually decline to enforce certain state laws, and it will tell us how to abide by the will of the voters to the extent that we can," Hanson said. "It will also safeguard the County in the event we're ever sued by an organization, for example - a gun safety group, due to the measures."

Notice and summons to the County and all electors or interested persons will be posted once a week for the next three weeks. Any interested person will have ten days from the date of the final publication to appear and contest the regularity, legality, validity, and effect of the Ordinance.

"As Columbia County Sheriff, it is my responsibility to ensure the rights of all of our citizens are protected, including the 2nd Amendment right to bear arms," Sheriff Brian Pixley said. "I look forward to the validation process so we can move forward with the will of the voters".

Volunteers from eleven counties have filed a SASO initiative petition, and the county clerks from five of those counties rejected the filings. Six county clerks accepted the filings and four of those counties currently have an active SASO petition circulating, Clatsop,

Lane, Tillamook, and Umatilla, but due to the pandemic, the signature-gathering has slowed to a crawl.

The Chief Petitioners in **Columbia & Coos** County were successful in garnering enough valid signatures to put the SASO on the ballot for the general election in November of 2020. The voters of Columbia County should vote YES for Measure 5-278 and the voters of Coos County should vote YES for Measure 6-181. Get your friends and neighbors to vote YES, too.

These county campaigns need signatures to reach the goal to turn their counties into a sanctuary for law-abiding citizens who support their Right to Keep and Bear Arms, so any help would be greatly appreciated.

ORS 33.710-.720 provides a process to submit an ordinance to the Circuit Court for validation. The ordinance must first be adopted by the Board of Commissioners. I do not know at this point if the County intends to use that process related to the Second Amendment Preservation Ordinance or the Second Amendment Sanctuary Ordinance. The previous court proceedings related to the SASO were related to whether the initiative qualified for the ballot. The criteria for qualification for a ballot are very limited and don't include whether an initiative, if passed, is enforceable (constitutional, etc.). The two initiatives are very similar but I have not reviewed either recently so cannot comment on the specific differences.







I explained to Mr. Guess that Oregon is an open carry state and because of the pre-emption statute (ORS166-170), ONLY the Legislature can make laws, rules, etc. concerning them with VERY FEW EXCEPTIONS, and that I had a CHL anyway which is allowed in public places (including schools) and that ONLY the Legislature could make laws, rules, etc. concerning them with NO exceptions (ORS 166-370), so, moot point. Mr. Guess kept screaming unprofessionally that the COUNTY owns the fair grounds and that it is private property. I explained that county property is PUBLIC property owned by the people, but he just kept repeating the same nonsense and couldn't get the point. I bring this up because supposedly Mr. Guess was in the area when Misty was harassed, intimidated and having her Rights violated. I left a voice mail for Commissioner Heimueller and told him the situation and came by my booth about a half an hour later and said he had taken care of it and I was OK. By the way, tonight Mr. Guess was bragging to Misty that he had kicked me out of the fair for the same thing a couple of years ago which was a lie as I finished the rest of the fair in my booth, so I do not know if he is delusional as well as being a pompous ass.

I was harassed by the St. Helens Police several years ago when they found out that I had carried a gun on school grounds and they tried the same old tired intimidation, yelling thing on me then too. After a long discussion, I told them to arrest me next time, and Oregon Firearms would sue them. Several months later, one of the officers admitted that I was right. Oregon Firearms Federation had just won 2 lawsuits against 2 separate Universities over this same issue.

I am sick to death of Police and County employees trying to legislate their own laws and redefine public property in order to harass, inconvenience and intimidate people. I'm sick of the bullying of law abiding, tax paying citizens, and I'm sick of the attacks on our Natural Born Rights. I'm tired of people perjuring their Oath of Office and want people to know that it won't be tolerated or uncontested. I will be calling the founder of Oregon Firearms Federation, Kevin Starrett and decide what the next step is, but the fact is that these bullying tactics, violations of peoples rights, and unprofessionalism has to stop once and for all.

This email, in no way should be considered legal advice, as I am not an attorney, but to wrap this up, it is perfectly legal to carry open or concealed at the Fairgrounds which is property owned by the PUBLIC, but Misty fox has an Oregon and Washington CHL anyway as well as a DPSST card, so in my opinion, only an ignorant Deputy would have harassed her and thrown her out of the fair anyway. This issue is not dead, but just beginning as we will not have our employees harassing us. You will hear more of this in the papers and whatever course Kevin Starrett decides. God Bless.
