WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission was established by the Mayor and City Council, "to plan for, and advise the mayor and city council, the city manager and the public on the water, wastewater and electric utilities;" and

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission has reviewed and concurs with the recommendations of City staff, engineers, and consultants that certain water and sewer system expenditures and improvements are necessary to continue properly operating and maintaining those utility systems; and

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission has reviewed the proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 City of Bandon Budget, and has found that current water and sewer utility rates are projected to be insufficient to generate the revenue necessary to continue properly operating, maintaining, and improving those utility systems; and

WHEREAS, considering the needs and projected revenues for the water and sewer systems, the Utilities Commission has determined that an EMERGENCY exists in the water and sewer utility budgets.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Utilities Commission hereby recommends that the Mayor and City Council declare that an EMERGENCY exists in the water and sewer utility system budgets;

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, to help protect the health, safety, economic, and general welfare of existing and future citizens, visitors, and utility customers of the City of Bandon; to help provide an adequate supply of high quality, safe water for drinking, fire protection, commercial, and other domestic uses; to help ensure adequate and safe sewage treatment and effluent discharge; and to help keep future water and sewer and property tax rates as low as possible, the Utilities Commission hereby recommends that the Mayor and City Council immediately take following actions:

Immediately Institute emergency water and sewer rate increases in the amounts necessary to generate sufficient revenues to cover all of the water and sewer system operation and maintenance expenses. The proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget currently projects shortfalls of approximately \$200,000 in the Water Fund (940) and \$198,000 in the Sewer Fund (950). Based on the revenues currently projected in the proposed Budget, generating sufficient revenues to cover these shortfalls would require a water rate increase of approximately 37% and a sewer rate increase of approximately 24%.

- 2. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan the expenditure of \$250,000 from the Water Plant Improvement Fund (941) for the following project capital improvement project:

Direct the City Manager to immediately initiate negotiations with private and public financial institutions and lenders to determine the availability, costs, and terms of loans and grants that may be available for providing \$3,500,000 to finance the following sewer system capital improvements:
 - A. Wastewater treatment plant headworks upgrade (\$450,000).
 - Replacement of the Fillmore Avenue pump station (\$1,600,000).
 - C. Wastewater treatment plant ultraviolet system improvements (\$100,000).
 - D. 2017-2018 I&I Study Projects #4, #5, #9, and #11 (\$1,300,000).
 - E. Financing/bond issuance costs (\$50,000).
- 5. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan, and place before the voters at the November 5, 2019, general election (the soonest possible simple-majority tax levy election), the matter of a general obligation bond in the amount of \$3,500,000 (minus the amount of available grants) to finance the sewer system improvements listed in Item 4 above. If the proposed general obligation bond for sewer system improvements is not approved by the voters, then it is recommended that a sewer revenue bond be issued to cover those costs, which would require an additional sewer rate increase of approximately 25% to cover the annual payments necessary to service the debt on that revenue bond.

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Utilities Commission recommends that the Mayor and City Council continue to monitor the financial condition and needs of the water, sewer, and electric utilities, and annually adjust the utility rates as necessary to meet the operation, maintenance, and capital needs of those utilities.

Hi,

My life is so woefully dismal that I eagerly open your attachments. Also, I am so obsessive that I am working on refining the newsletter to eliminate all of the sugar coating.

I've read the proposed resolution through twice and I think it covers the problem.

The lower figures Robert gave us for the Water and the Sewer shortfalls are here. I suspect that's because the language of the resolution accounts for the higher figures Robert gave to the Utilities Commission and not the Council or Budget Committee.

I eagerly await your tale of City interaction. See, I told you my life is dismal.

I'm providing some background points, merely because they are background points; I'm an historian; I need to use my notes for something. On 2/10/16, we were informed by C. Good, that our expenditures are outpacing our revenues. The Commission discussed how we wanted to approach the utility rate issue and agreed that maintenance must be done on an ongoing basis. This is when the Commission agreed that we were not going to put rate setting on the November. ballot (in response to Bob Berry's question regarding same). We agreed that we need to increase the base rate. The Chair of the Utilities Commission, you, said that we need a cost of service study, which we haven't gotten to this day, 4/10/19.

At the Utilities Commission meeting on 3/16/16, Chris Good addressed closing the gap in the water fund. Figures given were: \$360,000 out of capital funding for seismic retrofit and filter/media, regular operations. We'd still have a deficit of \$100-600K. Proposals were made. Increase in rates, 54%. Emergency power generator at the water plant.

At the 3/30/16 meeting we worked under the stated premise: "Utilities are a business, fees support the business lust like any business." We proposed a minimal amount of water rate raise. \$10/month residential, \$20/month commercial. This will pay for maintenance and damage control but is not enough to. build up a reserve account. We need to maintain what we have.

At the 5/11/16 meeting, we figured out how to publicize the rate increases and said we would tell the people exactly what we are doing. 4 projects identified: filter/media; chlorine generator; seismic valve; refurbishing 2million gallon water tank. Additional mentions of back up pumps/generators. Daniel Graham asked, "If this doesn't pass, then what?" Answer: "Transfer \$ from the General Fund and from other areas."

In 2016, all of he meetings above included detailed discussion of the proposed reservoir.

Back to the newsletter. Bye for now, Sheryl

Mary:

I made the adjustment to specify the "2 million gallon" water treatment plant seismic protection valves. (Good catch!)

As far as the other items related to the lack of accountability in the 941 Fund, intentional restriction of public information, intentionally not informing the Commission of the problems, and requesting an outside audit, those may best be subjects addressed in a different venue. I was trying to use this Resolution in an effort to fix the problems with the proposed budget. If you feel strongly that they should be included in this Resolution, I'm not sure the best and most appropriate way to do that, so perhaps you can suggest some language to be added.

I believe the utility shortfalls are essentially the result of not having adequate revenues to cover the costs to operate and maintain aging facilities, which I had predicted in my Budget Messages for many years prior to my retirement in 2014. That is why the City made prior (albeit unsuccessful) attempts to regain utility rate setting authority and increase rates.

I believe the place where the "spillage" costs were "absorbed" was in the Electric Fund (910) – Source of Supply expenditures, which are shown on Page 51 of the proposed budget. Robert should be able to clarify whether or not that is the case.

Let's say, for example, you owned a building supply store, and one day your customers voted not to allow you to ever raise prices. Your merchandise continued to rise in price and other expenses increased, but you could not raise your prices. You kept going back to your customers, explaining your situation, but still they said "no increases." Eventually, you could no longer remain in business, and you were forced to close your doors.

This is essentially the same situation faced by the City of Bandon, but we cannot stop providing clean water and treated sewage ... just because we are not allowed to raise our rates without a vote of the people. This charter amendment was put in place more than 20 years ago by the voters; in the early years we were allowed to raise rates just enough to pay our pre-existing agreements with the state on sewer and water bonds. Those agreements have now been paid off, and we are facing an emergency in our ability to operate and maintain both the sewer and the water utility.

Not only can we not fund day to day operation and maintenance of our facilities, but the sewage treatment plant is nearing the end of its 20-year life and will require extensive upgrades.

The city council has been entrusted to take care of the health and welfare of the people of Bandon.

As a result we are declaring an emergency, which will require us to raise our water rates 37 percent and our sewer rates 24 percent.

Based on the basic bill, which provides 2,000 gallons of water a month, your bill will go up to approximately \$14 a month.

I looked at my last utility bill. I used 1,000 gallons of water for a water and sewer bill of \$46.22. Even if I had used 2,000 gallons of water, my bill would have gone up only \$14 to \$60.37. In the summer, if I choose to keep a green lawn and water almost daily (whether I need to or not), my bill will increase.

How does that same usage compare with our neighbors: in Myrtle Point your bill would be \$70 a month; Powers, \$77 a month; Coos Bay, \$72; Port Orford, \$83 a month and Coquille, \$124 a month. And not only that, but our electric bills are cheaper than either Coos-Curry Electric or Pacific Power.

As one member of our utility commission put it so well: if we are not able to prevent raw sewage from spilling out onto the bay and we can no longer provide safe, clean drinking water, the state could well step in, take over our utilities, and charge whatever is necessary to maintain both systems. That is the last thing we want to happen!

We have dedicated people at both our sewer and water plants. All they ask is they have the resources to maintain those systems. That is why the City Council is planning to declare an emergency.

We will definitely have a town hall meeting to explain our short and long-range plans and what has led up to the emergency declaration.
