FINDINGS BY THE BANDON UTILITIES COMMISSION THAT AN EMERGENCY EXISTS IN THE PROPOSED FISCAL YEAR 2019-2020 WATER AND SEWER UTILITY BUDGETS; AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ACTION BY THE CITY COUNCIL TO ADDRESS THAT EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission was established by the Mayor and City Council, "to plan for, and advise the mayor and city council, the city manager and the public on the water, wastewater and electric utilities;" and

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission has reviewed and concurs with the recommendations of City staff, engineers, and consultants that certain water and sewer system expenditures and improvements are necessary to continue properly operating and maintaining those utility systems; and

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission has reviewed the proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 City of Bandon Budget, and has found that current water and sewer utility rates and revenues are projected to be insufficient to generate the revenue necessary to continue properly operating, maintaining, and improving those utility systems; and

WHEREAS, prior to the proposed 2019-2020 Budget presentation, the Utilities Commission was not aware of the Water (940), Water Plant Improvement Fund (941), and Sewer Fund (950) shortfalls or current cash balances; and

WHEREAS, considering the needs and projected revenues for the water and sewer systems, the Utilities Commission has found that an EMERGENCY exists in the water and sewer utility budgets.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE UTILITIES COMMISSION HEREBY RECOMMENDS that the Mayor and City Council immediately declare that an EMERGENCY exists in the proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 water and sewer utility system budgets;

AND, IT IS FURTHER RECOMMENDED that, to address the EMERGENCY; to help protect the health, safety, economic, and general welfare of existing and future citizens, visitors, and utility customers of the City of Bandon; to help provide an adequate supply of high quality, safe water for drinking, fire protection, commercial, and other domestic uses; to help ensure adequate and safe sewage treatment and effluent discharge; and to help keep future water and sewer and property tax rates as low as possible, the Utilities Commission, hereby recommends that the Mayor and City Council take following actions:

Institute one-year EMERGENCY water and sewer rate increases for fiscal year 2019-2020 in amounts necessary to generate sufficient revenues to cover all of the water and sewer system operation and maintenance expenses. The proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget currently projects shortfalls of approximately \$160,000 in the Water Fund (940) and \$222,000 in the Sewer Fund (950). Based on the revenues currently projected in the proposed Budget, plus 5% for contingencies, generating sufficient revenues to cover these shortfalls would require a water rate increase of approximately 21% and a sewer rate increase of approximately 28%.

- 2. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan the expenditure of \$250,000 from the Water Plant Improvement Fund (941) for the following capital improvement project:
  - a million gallon treated water storage tank seismic protection valves.
- Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan the expenditure of \$1,000,000 from the Water SDC Improvement Fund (721) for the following projects:
  - A. Re-painting and corrosion repair on the 1MG and 2MG treated water storage tanks (\$500,000).
  - B. Emergency back-up generators for the water treatment plant (\$500,000).
- 4. Initiate negotiations with private and public financial institutions, lenders, and bond counsel to determine the amount, costs, and terms of loans and grants that may be available for providing \$4,400,000 to finance the following water and sewer system capital improvements:
  - A. Wastewater treatment plant headworks upgrade (\$450,000).
  - B. Replacement of the Fillmore Avenue pump station (\$1,600,000).
  - C. Wastewater treatment plant ultraviolet system improvements (\$100,000).
  - D. 2017-2018 I&I Study Projects #4, #5, #9, and #11 (\$1,300,000).
  - E. Water Plant Replacement Clarifier (\$950,000).
- 5. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan, and place before the voters at the November 5, 2019, general election (the soonest possible simple-majority tax levy election), the matter of a general obligation bond which, in combination with any grant funds which may be available, will provide \$4,400,000 in net proceeds to finance the water & sewer system improvements listed in Item 4 above. Adding 10% for bond issuance, bond counsel and underwriters costs, contingencies, etc., and assuming no outside grant funding, it is estimated that repayment of a 20-year bond in the amount of \$4,840,000, at a 5% annual interest rate, would require property tax assessments in the range of \$0.79 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, based on the 2018-2019 City assessed valuation of \$490,372,860.

If the proposed general obligation bond for water and sewer system improvements is not approved by the voters, then it is recommended that sewer and water revenue bonds be issued to cover those costs, which would require an additional estimated 20-year EMERGENCY water rate increase in the range of 11%, and sewer rate increase in the range of 37%, to cover the annual payments necessary to service the debt on that revenue bond.

AND, IT IS FURTHER RECOMMENDED that the Mayor and City Council continue to monitor the financial condition and needs of the water, sewer, and electric utilities, and determine annually whether an EMERGENCY exists in those municipal utilities; and determine whether subsequent annual EMERGENCY utility rate increases and actions are necessary to meet the future operation, maintenance, and capital improvement needs of those utilities.

AND, IT IS FURTHER RECOMMENDED that the Mayor and City Council place before Bandon voters at the next possible and appropriate election the matter of amending the Bandon City Charter to restore PERMANENT utility rate setting authority to the Mayor and City Council.

The Utilities Commission will be reporting to the City Council on the following items:

#### Monthly Newsletter and Bulletin Boards

<u>Commissioner Sheryl Bremmer</u> continues to maintain and update the bulletin board inside the south City Hall lobby, continue the informational sucker bucket at the front City Hall desk, and prepare the monthly Utilities Newsletters which are included with the utility bills.

<u>Commissioner Mary O'Dea</u> continues to maintain and update the electric, water, and sewer utilities informational display in the north City Hall lobby.

#### 2. Earth Day Celebration

The Mayor and City Council and others are invited to attend the May 15<sup>th</sup> Utilities Commission meeting to hear a presentation by John Tannous from the Artula Institute regarding the Utilities Commission partnering with Washed Ashore on a Bandon Earth Day, 2020. All of these organizations are concerned about the matter of disposing non-disposable items such as plastics, wipes, etc., as pointed out in recent articles in the monthly City Utilities Newsletter on the subject of "There is No 'Away' in 'Thrown Away." Commissioner Joe Kuehner is heading up this effort on behalf of the Utilities Commission. (See attachments regarding the proposed Earth Day Celebration.)

#### 3. Water Utility Business Plan

Work on the Water Utility Business Plan continues. "Section I - Background/ History" has been completed, thanks to Commissioner Patricia Soltys. "Section II - Current Operations" and "Section III - Future Considerations" are being prepared by City staff. Work on "Section IV - Strategic Plan" will be undertaken by the Commission once City staff has completed Sections II and III.

#### Water Master Plan

The Commission is waiting on data and information from the City Engineer and City staff.

#### 5. Water Management & Conservation Plan

Commissioner Mary O'Dea is heading up the Commission's work on this. We are waiting on data and information from City staff.

#### 6. Water Storage Reservoir

The Commission is waiting on permit approvals from the Oregon Water Resources Department and is recommending that City staff meet with State and Federal officials to determine the status of possible loan and grant funding for this and other water and sewer improvement projects.

#### 7. Water Rights

The matter of water rights is in the hands of the City's Water Rights Attorney and City Attorney.

#### 8. Rate Setting Authority

After reviewing the proposed Fiscal Year 2019-2020 City Budget, the Commission has determined that an EMERGENCY exists in the Water and Sewer Funds, and is recommending that the Mayor and City Council similarly declare an EMERGENCY, and take appropriate actions as described in the attached "Findings and Recommendations" from the Utilities Commission.





## The Purpose of the Wastewater Treatment Plant

"The Bandon WWTP is an integral part of the Bandon Community. It provides treatment and disinfection of wastewater from residences, businesses, and industry to levels specified in the City's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit (Appendix I), and to levels commensurate with the values of the citizens of Bandon."

"The Bandon WWTP not only provides for the immediate protection of public health, but also for the protection of coastal fisheries. Fishing is still an important industry in the Bandon area. Chemicals and microorganisms in a poorly treated discharge can severely impact marine life. Because of the potential damage from a poor quality effluent to shellfish in the Coquille River Estuary, the Bandon WWTP is designed in Class I of the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) Design Criteria for Mechanical, Electrical, Fluid System and Component Reliability."

"The men and women who manage and support the operations of the Bandon WWTP are charged with an important responsibility. Providing the necessary level of treatment in a cost-effective manner is a reasonable expectation of the citizens and rate payers. The plant represents a significant capital investment of the community and must be operated and maintained to ensure its protections and long life."

# Unplanned Wastewater Treatment Plant Expense

The top gears of the clarifier went out. This makes everything go more slowly. Bill Nielson, the manager of the plant, bought parts for repairing this problem at a cost of \$10,000. The bottom gears will be inspected and, as of now, we don't know what is happening in this bottom section. When we have a cost of repairs, we will inform you as soon thereafter as is feasible. Keep in mind that the Wastewater Treatment Plant has many parts that are nearing the end of their life expectancy.

#### Influent Pump

The influent pump at the Wastewater Treatment Plant pumps all wastewater. We have had multiple incidents where the pump is negatively affected by grease and rags. When the pump no longer works properly, it has to be taken to Coos Bay to be remachined at a cost of \$20,000 per incident. The problems caused by grease and rags are expensive to repair and eventually repairs are no longer effective and replacement of parts will be necessary. We can control some recurring problems by remembering that "flushable wipes" are not flushable and that grease and wipes/rags should be kept out of the wastewater system if at all possible. If an item can be throw in the trash, do that, don't flush it or put it down the drain.

#### **Bonneville Power Authority**

Bonneville Power Authority (BPA) has announced that it will raise electric rates this year. We informed rate payers of a spillage charge last year and BPA has indicated that there **may** be another spillage charge this year. Rate payers bear the responsibility of paying these increases and as soon as we know how much the electric rates will rise and exactly why they are rising, we will inform you.



## There is No Away

What does this mean? "I'm going to throw this (cup, chair, food, trash, plastic straw, styrofoam take-out carton) away." What are you saying? Where is whatever you're tossing going? How long will it take to break down and decompose back into Earth? Will it even decompose? What animals will try and eat it? Are there other options besides throwing it "away?" When you dispose of something down your drain, where is it going?

#### What you throw "away" goes somewhere.

Some of what you think you are throwing away can cause problems for you and the utilities upon which you rely. For instance, you wouldn't think of using your sink to dispose of your grocery list, but produce stickers stuck to some of your fruits and vegetables often fall off when you're washing those fruits and vegetables. These stickers often include bits of plastic and are coated with adhesive, neither of which are water-soluble. They may be caught in grease coating your drains, get caught in pumps and hoses or block the screens and filters at your wastewater treatment plant.

It might seem logical to flush your expired or unused medication down the toilet or crush it in your garbage disposal, but research shows that a high number of those medications do not get removed at your local wastewater treatment plant before they enter the environment. Wastewater treatment is unable to remove medications.

Prevention and maintenance are considerably less costly than breakdown and replacement.

# Results of the 2018 Wastewater Treatment Facilities Assessment<sup>1</sup>

This is the first in a series of reports about this assessment.

The City of Bandon operates and maintains a 0.50 Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) that experienced its last plant-wide improvement project in 1993. Since then the facility has completed several system specific upgrades including:



Influent Screen system was replaced in early 2000s

Ultraviolet Disinfection system replaced in 2009

Standby Generator for WWTP installed in 2014

Thickening system was replaced in 2015

According to the Wastewater Treatment Facilities Assessment, The Screening and Grit

#### Priority List For WWTP

Headworks System Upgrade \$450,000

Replacement of Fillmore Pump Station \$1,600,000

UV System Improvements \$100,000

In future newsletters we will describe these projects and explain why they are necessary.

This is list #1. List #2 is on the next page.

Removal system is in the greatest need of refurbishment. The current system is not capable of providing screening at current WWTP flow conditions. The debris that bypasses screening obstructs process lines including grit piping and clarifier sludge collectors. Debris also obstructs the pumps requiring regular operator intervention to maintain pumping.

The Influent Pump Station also has ragging and grit accumulation. Issues that require operator intervention.

Rags ("disposable" wipes, facial tissues, diapers, paper towels etc.) cause serious problems when they reach the WWTP. "Flushable" or "disposable" wipes are not flushable without negative consequences. Manufacturers of these wipes just meet the requirements needed to call the wipes they sell "flushable" or "disposable". Our sewer system and WWTP clog when people flush these wipes "away". In this case "away" is through the sewer lines and into the WWTP. Grease and oil make the clogs worse.

#### Influent Pump

Currently, it costs approximately \$20,000 each time the pump breaks down. The broken parts can no longer be re-machined in Coos Bay and replacement parts have to be purchased. The current influent pump is the only one we have handling sewer water for the entire city. The problem is serious. We just had another incident where the pump had to be repaired, costing another \$20,000, which brings the total cost this year to \$60,000. Each of us can mitigate this problem and increase the life of the influent pump if we would stop flushing anything that can be thrown in the trash down the toilet or into the drains. Flushable wipes may be flushable; a lego is flushable, too, but these items must be kept out of the sewer system. Flushable wipes and grease create serious problems for the WWTP and serious costs for all of us to repair the damages they cause.

#### Inflow and Infiltration Study

One of the problems identified in this study was that sewer clean out caps are missing or broken on some properties in Bandon. If you know where your sewer clean out is and you inspect it and find that the cap is missing or broken please call 541-347-2437 and a City employee will come out and replace the cap for you with no charge. If you don't know where your sewer clean out is, please call the number above.

FINDINGS BY THE BANDON UTILITIES COMMISSION THAT AN EMERGENCY EXISTS IN THE PROPOSED FISCAL YEAR 2019-2020 WATER AND SEWER UTILITY BUDGETS; AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ACTION BY THE CITY COUNCIL TO ADDRESS THAT EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission was established by the Mayor and City Council, "to plan for, and advise the mayor and city council, the city manager and the public on the water, wastewater and electric utilities;" and

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission has reviewed and concurs with the recommendations of City staff, engineers, and consultants that certain water and sewer system expenditures and improvements are necessary to continue properly operating and maintaining those utility systems; and

WHEREAS, the Utilities Commission has reviewed the proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 City of Bandon Budget, and has found that current water and sewer utility rates and revenues are projected to be insufficient to generate the revenue necessary to continue properly operating, maintaining, and improving those utility systems; and

WHEREAS, prior to the proposed 2019-2020 Budget presentation, the Utilities Commission was not aware of the Water (940), Water Plant Improvement Fund (941), and Sewer Fund (950) shortfalls or current cash balances; and

WHEREAS, considering the needs and projected revenues for the water and sewer systems, the Utilities Commission has found that an EMERGENCY exists in the water and sewer utility budgets.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE UTILITIES COMMISSION HEREBY RECOMMENDS that the Mayor and City Council immediately declare that an EMERGENCY exists in the proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 water and sewer utility system budgets;

AND, IT IS FURTHER RECOMMENDED that, to address the EMERGENCY; to help protect the health, safety, economic, and general welfare of existing and future citizens, visitors, and utility customers of the City of Bandon; to help provide an adequate supply of high quality, safe water for drinking, fire protection, commercial, and other domestic uses; to help ensure adequate and safe sewage treatment and effluent discharge; and to help keep future water and sewer and property tax rates as low as possible, the Utilities Commission, hereby recommends that the Mayor and City Council take following actions:

Institute one-year EMERGENCY water and sewer rate increases for fiscal year 2019-2020 in amounts necessary to generate sufficient revenues to cover all of the water and sewer system operation and maintenance expenses. The proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget currently projects shortfalls of approximately \$160,000 in the Water Fund (940) and \$222,000 in the Sewer Fund (950). Based on the revenues currently projected in the proposed Budget, plus 5% for contingencies, generating sufficient revenues to cover these shortfalls would require a water rate increase of approximately 21% and a sewer rate increase of approximately 28%.

- 2. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan the expenditure of \$250,000 from the Water Plant Improvement Fund (941) for the following capital improvement project:
  - A. 2 million gallon treated water storage tank seismic protection valves.
- Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan the expenditure of \$1,000,000 from the Water SDC Improvement Fund (721) for the following projects:
  - A. Re-painting and corrosion repair on the 1MG and 2MG treated water storage tanks (\$500,000).
  - B. Emergency back-up generators for the water treatment plant (\$500,000).
- 4. Initiate negotiations with private and public financial institutions, lenders, and bond counsel to determine the amount, costs, and terms of loans and grants that may be available for providing \$4,400,000 to finance the following water and sewer system capital improvements:
  - A. Wastewater treatment plant headworks upgrade (\$450,000).
  - Replacement of the Fillmore Avenue pump station (\$1,600,000).
  - C. Wastewater treatment plant ultraviolet system improvements (\$100,000).
  - D. 2017-2018 I&I Study Projects #4, #5, #9, and #11 (\$1,300,000).
  - E. Water Plant Replacement Clarifier (\$950,000).
- 5. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan, and place before the voters at the November 5, 2019, general election (the soonest possible simple-majority tax levy election), the matter of a general obligation bond which, in combination with any grant funds which may be available, will provide \$4,400,000 in net proceeds to finance the water & sewer system improvements listed in Item 4 above. Adding 10% for bond issuance, bond counsel and underwriters costs, contingencies, etc., and assuming no outside grant funding, it is estimated that repayment of a 20-year bond in the amount of \$4,840,000, at a 5% annual interest rate, would require property tax assessments in the range of \$0.79 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, based on the 2018-2019 City assessed valuation of \$490,372,860.

If the proposed general obligation bond for water and sewer system improvements is not approved by the voters, then it is recommended that sewer and water revenue bonds be issued to cover those costs, which would require an additional estimated 20-year EMERGENCY water rate increase in the range of 11%, and sewer rate increase in the range of 37%, to cover the annual payments necessary to service the debt on that revenue bond.

AND, IT IS FURTHER RECOMMENDED that the Mayor and City Council continue to monitor the financial condition and needs of the water, sewer, and electric utilities, and determine annually whether an EMERGENCY exists in those municipal utilities, and determine whether subsequent annual EMERGENCY utility rate increases and actions are necessary to meet the future operation, maintenance, and capital improvement needs of those utilities.

AND, IT IS FURTHER RECOMMENDED that the Mayor and City Council place before Bandon voters at the next possible and appropriate election the matter of amending the Bandon City Charter to restore PERMANENT utility rate setting authority to the Mayor and City Council.

The Utilities Commission will be reporting to the City Council on the following items:

#### 1. Monthly Newsletter and Bulletin Boards

#### 2. Earth Day Celebration

The Mayor and City Council and others are invited to attend the May 15th Utilities Commission meeting to hear a presentation by John Tannous from the Artula Institute regarding the Utilities Commission partnering with Washed Ashore on a Bandon Earth Day, 2020. - And, it is further recommended that the Mayor and City Council continue to monitor the financial condition and needs of the water, sewer, and electric utilities, and determine annually whether an emergency exists in those municipal utilities; and determine whether subsequent annual emergency utility rate increases and actions are necessary to meet the future operation, maintenance, and capital improvement needs of those utilities.
- And, it is further recommended that the Mayor and City Council place before Bandon voters at the next possible and appropriate election the matter of amending the Bandon City Charter to restore **permanent** utility rate setting authority to the Mayor and City Council.

Adopted by the Utilities Commission on April 24, 2019.

This is an important issue that has been discussed by the Utilities Commission and Mayor and City Council, by the Budget Committee, and that will be discussed at the June City Council meeting. If the Mayor and City Council agree to accept the recommendations above, there will be a great deal of explanation, examples, and opportunities for citizens and rate payers to ask questions, receive honest answers, and discuss what these actions mean. - 1. Institute one-year emergency water and sewer rate increases for fiscal year 2019-2020 in amounts necessary to generate sufficient revenues to cover all of the water and sewer system operation and maintenance expenses. The proposed fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget currently projects shortfalls of approximately \$160,000 in the Water Fund and \$222,000 in the Sewer Fund. Based on the revenues currently projected in the proposed Budget, plus 5% for contingencies, generating sufficient revenues to cover these shortfalls wold require a water rate increase of approximately 21% and a sewer rate increase of approximately 28%.
- 2. Include the expenditure of \$25,000 from the Water Plant Improvement Fund for the following capital improvement project: 2 million gallon treated water storage tank seismic protection valves;
- 3. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan the expenditure of \$1,000,000 from the Water SDC Improvement Fund for the following projects: Re-painting and corrosion repair on the 1MG and 2MG treated water storage tanks (\$500,000); and Emergency back-up generators for the water treatment plant (\$500,000);
- 4. Initiate negotiations with private and public financial institutions, lenders, and bond counsel to determine the amount, costs, and terms of loans and grants that may be available for providing \$4,400,000 to finance the following water and sewer system capital improvements: Wastewater

Treatment Plant headworks upgrade (\$450,000); Replacement of the Fillmore Avenue pump station (\$1,600,000); Wastewater Treatment Plant ultraviolet system improvements (\$100,000); 2017-2018 I&I Study Projects #4, #5, #9, and #11 (\$1,300,000); Water Plant Replacement Clarifier (\$950,000);

- 5. Include in the fiscal year 2019-2020 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan, and place before the voters at the November 5, 2019, general election, the matter of a general obligation bond which, in combination with any grant funds which may be available, will provide \$4,400,000 in net proceeds to finance the water and sewer system improvements in Item 4 above.
